Ordinary planning applications for local people are refused and large projects like this are encouraged by the Government.

An independent group has been established called 'Save Gaerwen' in order to send an their opinions directly to the Planning Inspector.

A Facebook page has been set up with over 400 members, many questions are raised on it.

Offshore plans 2:1 more effective than onshore but cheaper onshore. Community Chest for both types of plans.

Who will win, the landowners, no one is interested in the Community Chest, we can't be bribed!

Who wants a 180m tower on their doorstep, nobody!
